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My classroom is in a small school in rural North Dakota. I am a general education teacher, and I have a classroom of 18 kindergarteners this year. I do have a couple children with special needs and a lot of really great parents. I teach in a very supportive community that really takes an interest in students within the school setting. I, as a teacher am always looking for really great ways to get my parents even more involved within the classroom setting. Using *A Checklist for Schools*, I have created six strategies for my classroom. These are some strategies that I plan on using in my classroom throughout the school year:

Parenting

### Parent Mentor Program

Something that I would like to implement to provide extended support beyond the classroom and school is to provide my kindergarten parents with a mentor parent that came help them through the kindergarten years. I would set up a parent mentor for any parent who has a first child kindergartener, a child with special needs, and also any other parent that would benefit from or want a parent mentor. Of course, this is an option for the parents, it would not be required. A first time parent having their first child go to kindergarten might be a little nervous and have a lot of questions that they might not feel comfortable asking the teacher. I would definitely emphasize how beneficial this mentor could be, especially for parents that have a child with special needs because it would be extremely beneficial. This mentor would also just be someone that they could confide in and get to know to help them get involved with the school. At the beginning of the school year I would send home the following letter:

I am so excited to have your child in my classroom this year. I understand that starting kindergarten can be a scary thing, for both the parent and the child. It can be an emotional time as your child is truly growing up! It might be the first time your child has been away from you for a full day or even just a few hours. As the teacher, it is my job to help you feel as comfortable as possible with this transition. First of all, I would like you to know that I am not only here for your child, I am also here for you. I want you to know that my door is always open, and I am here to help make this transition a smooth one.

I am also excited to tell you that we have a new program in which you can choose to have a parent mentor. This would be a parent who has gone through this transition a time or two before and would be willing to answer any questions that you may have. This parent would be able to help you get involved in the school, and just kind of show you the ropes. I would make my best effort to align each of you with a parent that I think would be a good fit. This is something I am very excited about. This is not required, but I think that it would be a great opportunity to take advantage of!

### Kindergarten Readiness Night

Something that kindergarten teachers in my hometown do is Kindergarten Readiness Night. This is an evening during the spring before the child starts kindergarten where the parents and the children come to the school into a kindergarten classroom for a couple of hours. This is a learning even for the whole family. If I did this within my classroom, I would include a few different activities, an activity for the whole family to do together, then an activity for the children to do while the parents have a little session learning about what kindergarten will be like for them and their child. This gives both the parents and the child a chance to go into a kindergarten classroom, explore a little bit, and ask any questions they may have. This would be beneficial because then the next fall will not seem so scary because they kind of know what to expect. Then, I would also include a couple of books about kindergarten, like The Night Before *Kindergarten* and *Countdown to Kindergarten*. This is something that encourages learning at home by encouraging the parents to read with their child and talk about what kindergarten will be like. I would send a flyer home with all of the preschool parents, hang it up around the community, and also post it on the school's social media pages to try to reach as any families as possible. This is a flyer I would send and post:

### Mystery Reader

Volunteering is an important part of any classroom. As a teacher I will encourage a lot of parents/other family members to volunteer within my classroom. One thing that I really want to encourage my family members to do in my classroom is come in as mystery readers. I think this is a fun way to get parents involved, and it is always good for children to hear a different voice read books sometimes. This would be sent out within the first few weeks of school. I would probably like a parent to come in once a week or so to keep students and parents excited about being a mystery reader in my classroom. However, after reading a couple of articles, I would want my parents to feel extremely comfortable doing this, if they do not feel comfortable reading to the whole class or reading in general, I would ask if they would want to read to a small group or even do something else with us, maybe a science experiment or math rotations. I would ask if the parent wanted to read a book they bring from home or if they would want me to pick a couple out for them. I used a model from Fairy Dust Teaching to create this. ### Reading around the Town

This is also something that I did while I was in Elementary School that I absolutely loved! This is an event that would go all school year, September through May. The students would be sent home with a reading log. They would need to read at least 15 minutes per day for at least 15 days a month (these requirements might be different). This could be the child reading books independently, reading with a family member, etc. However, no watching or listening to books on Youtube. This encourages parents to read with their child or at least encourage their child to read. Businesses around town would be asked to sponsor a month. During this month when a child brings the reading log back, they will get a certificate in which they can take to the business and receive their prize for that month. An example might be the local pizza place giving each child who completes this a free personal pizza or the grocery store giving them some kind of treat.
